RI Convention and District Conference 2021

Rotary International Convention Goes Virtual; District Conference Cancelled



Since our last communication with you, COVID conditions have continued to forecast difficulty with ensuring Rotary can safely hold large gatherings.

RI Convention: Rotary International has decided to move the International Convention scheduled for Taiwan this June to an online convention - much as last year's Honolulu convention moved to a virtual setting. We will be sharing more information with you as details become available.

District Conference: Meanwhile, here in Georgia our deadline for committing to the District Conference in Sandestin was just a few weeks away, so Governor Kirk and many people in district leadership spent considerable time in thought and discussion weighing the pros and cons of holding the conference. In the final conclusion, it was felt we could not ensure conditions would be safe and could not in good conscience risk the health of anyone in attendance. As such, Governor Kirk has elected to cancel district conference.

Governor Kirk is still looking at options for clubs to celebrate this year. He knows it is especially tough on this year's presidents who have given so much in the name of Rotary. Stayed tuned for further communication.

Many of you have registered already. We will process refunds. There is nothing you need to do. If you have

reserved a room, please cancel directly with Sandestin.

I was, along with you, looking forward to reconnecting with my fellow Rotarians at the beach. That day will come where we can once again be together and celebrate all that Rotary means to us and our communities.

If you have an open District Grant ALL documentation is to be uploaded to the district website, reviewed, and ACCEPTED by the District Grants team no later than **March 31, 2021**. If you have a grant that is currently in overdue status, documentation is to be uploaded immediately. Thank you to those clubs that have already uploaded their spending documentation.

This has been a very interesting year to say the least. The current pandemic has continued to impact our work as Rotarians. Yet, we have risen above the intermittent lockdowns and worked with our partnering organizations to complete the spending of the grant funds. Well done!

Should your club have any issues with completing the spending of your grant funds, please contact me immediately to discuss options. If at all possible, please have your documentation uploaded one week prior to the March 31, 2021 deadline to allow time for review, comment, and approval. Not uploading your documentation by the deadline may affect your clubs eligibility to apply for a District Grant for 2021-2022.

Celebrate 75 Years of GRSP This August in Thomasville

A tremendous project is underway in downtown Thomasville, Georgia to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of the Georgia Rotary Student Program. To be located at the main entrance to a strikingly new downtown

hotel, Rotary Districts 6900, 6910 and 6920 have the opportunity to name the main hotel entrance plaza and fountain in honor of the 75th GRSP anniversary year, 2021.

The plaza of the hotel will be named the GRSP Peace Plaza. The fountain located in the plaza will be named the Will Watt Memorial Fountain. A 24-inch bronze seal will be placed in front of the fountain denoting the anniversary and dedication date. A historical marker will be located at the hotel - with one side denoting Will Watt's vision for GRSP and the other side the history of GRSP.

You can join in the celebration and see the fountain when the **Rotary Club of Thomasville** hosts the 75th Anniversary GRSP Conclave in August 2021. The event is scheduled for August 20-21 ... mark your calendar now and watch for details.

Why Thomasville? GRSP was founded by Past District Governor and Thomasville Rotarian William A. (Mr. Will) Watt, Sr., in 1946 at the conclusion of World War II. Mr. Will wanted to promote world peace through understanding. For generations, Rotary members in Districts 6900, 6910 and 6920 have promoted world peace by generously funding and offering scholarships to international students for one year of study in a Georgia college or university. Georgia Rotarians believe "Peace is Possible" and through GRSP promote international goodwill through friendship and understanding.

In the role, Fields will be working closely with the GRSP Chair, officers, directors, and trustees as well as Georgia Rotary Clubs, GRSP students, government officials and the public.

Fields brings more than 20 years of writing, communication, marketing, strategic planning and corporate events experience, 10 in a supervisor's position with five of those years in public education and non-profit foundations for education. "I am excited by this opportunity to serve and promote that 'Peace is Possible'," said Fields "I have witnessed the benefits of the student scholarship program. I am excited to connect and and reinforce the bonds between Rotarians, education leaders, alumni of the program and the state at large."

Fields began her career as a sports writer for the Griffin Daily News and served as a state editor for the Asheville Citizen Times. From 2010 to 2015, Fields served as the Marketing Director and brand ambassador for Chick-fil-A of Griffin. In recognition for her efforts in the community, she received the Griffin-Spalding County Chamber of Commerce Ambassador of the Year Award in 2013.

Fields previously represented Southern Crescent Technical College as the Director for Institutional Advancement from 2015 to 2019. During her tenure at SCTC, she was responsible for fundraising for the college by acquiring funds, grants, gifts and scholarships. In that role, she collaborated with various department deans and vice presidents plus SCTC Foundation Trustees to create civic and donor presentations as well as grant applications. She assisted the Foundation in raising \$175,575 in grants in

Fiscal Year 2019 and helped acquire the Foundation's largest-gift-to-date, \$1,000,000 for College Renovation and Expansion in FY 2018. She was named the recipient of the 2019 National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD) Excellence Award for SCTC. Most recently,

Fields served as the marketing director for Gordon State College, where she served as the primary spokesperson for the college and as the crisis management adviser to the president. Fields managed the college's website and social media platforms. She created a five-year strategic enrollment management marketing and communication plan at Gordon to spearhead the branding efforts and recruiting initiatives within the college's 14-county service region. A native of Rome, Ga., Fields holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Communication from Berry College. She is an alumna of 2018 Leadership Griffin and 2017 Leadership Henry chamber programs. A Toastmaster and former Rotarian, she is excited to return to her local club in Griffin, where she and her husband Dale, an avid golfer, reside. "Katheryne's experience in higher education, marketing and development will prove invaluable to GRSP," said Guy. "Her impressive accomplishments speak to her abilities. I am extremely happy that Katheryne has joined our team and know she will quickly contribute to our program." Vinings Down Hill 5K Run for the Kids Sets Records During Pandemic



On January 27, 2021, the **Vinings Cumberland Rotary Club** gathered virtually to celebrate its donation of over \$100,000 to 17 charities specifically targeting children's projects. All this raised by a 66-member Rotary Club with money during the pandemic in the August 2020 Vinings Down Hill 5K run for the Kids.

Grant recipients included the Good Samaritan Health Center, Calvary Children's Home, American Red Cross, Arts Bridge Foundation, Atlanta Union Mission, Bankhead Boys Association, Breakthrough Atlanta, Canine Companions, Girls on the Run, Hero for Children, Kate's Club, Kenrod, Inc, Kyle Peasee Foundation, LaAmistad, Lekotek of Georgia, MUST Ministries and Youth Villages.

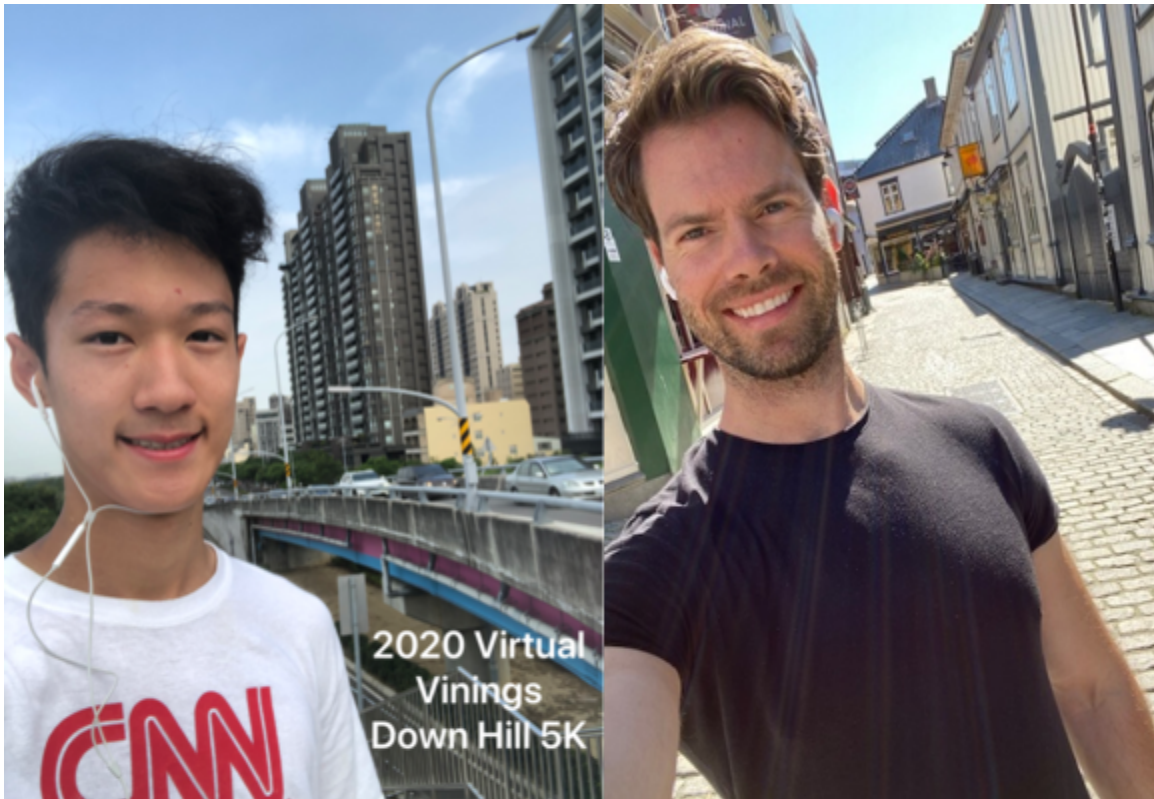
The money was raised by individual and corporate sponsors and featured the 2020 Charles Heinz Memorial Sponsorship, honoring the late founder and director of the race with over \$58,000 of the total grant funds.

Over 350 runners from all over the Atlanta area, across the USA and around the world (including former GRSP and Rotary Youth Exchange students) ran on their own, logged their time and sent their information into Race Chair Jolene Northrop. For 24 years, the race has always been an hands-on 5K race run by hundreds of Rotarians and volunteers in Vinings, a village across the Chattahoochee River northwest of Atlanta. This year, the race was almost complete cancelled because of the COVID pandemic. Instead, it was a record breaking success because of the persistent hard work of Jolene and her committee - Co-Chair Ann Hudgins, Sponsor Chair Betty Smith, Race Administrator Terri Hilderhoff, Grant Chair Steve Hughes, Paul Harris,, Kathy Gacutan and others.

The club's next race will be in August 2021- hopefully welcoming the typical 1500 runners live as in person

in Vinings as we celebrate our 25th anniversary. The legacy of the Charles Heinz Memorial Sponsorship of 2020 will continue to contribute to its success.

For Club's 100th Birthday, the Gift is Trees ... to the City



It's not every year that an organization celebrates its centennial anniversary. May 2021 will mark the **Rotary Club of Thomasville's** 100th birthday - and the club intends to celebrate all year long. Rotary Past President Jeff Zoller (pictured with President John Brown) summed up the core spirit of the club and its membership when he said, "Over the past 100 years, the Club and its members have made significant and diverse service contributions to the city, with innumerable members involved in service projects to youth and the community. Members have served in diverse leadership roles within the business, education, medical, and government spheres, including members who have served in city, county, and state governments."

To that spirit, President John Brown and his club members have a list of activities planned to celebrate this historic achievement, if current social conditions will allow. One such activity, a gift to our city, has already been successfully completed. Keen observers may have noticed recent activity on the west side of Paradise Park, where a team of arborists took the better part of the week of December 7 to plant 24- 15-foot live oaks (*Quercus virginiana*,) - a gift to the city from Thomasville's Rotarians. At cost of \$20,000, the trees were purchased from and planted by Lake Landscape, LLC of Whigham (pictured: Chris Collier from Lake Landscape). The City of Thomasville will play a key role in ensuring the continued good health and growth of the trees by providing irrigation.

Rotarian and Thomasville city councilman Jay Flowers was instrumental in project coordination between the club and the city. An ad hoc committee appointed by President John to select the perfect gift was led by Past President Jeff Zoller, and composed of senior Rotary members John Glenn, Homer Pankey, Harry Tomlinson, Warren Stafford, and Wayne Newsome. After two years of careful thought and planning and a slate of approximately a dozen proposals, the committee selected a gift that will enrich the lives of Thomasvillians for generations, 24 live oak trees which will continue to provide beauty and grace to Thomasville's focal green space, Paradise Park.

Thomasville's Big Oak which stands at the corner of Crawford and Monroe Streets is probably one of our most famous examples of a live oak, having stood its ground for well over 300 years. The live oak, which is the state tree of Georgia, has many attributes: it is highly wind resistant; its wood is dense and strong and as such is responsible for the nickname "Old Ironsides" given to the naval frigate USS Constitution which was made of wood from live oak trees. Its acorns provide food for turkeys, quail, ducks, deer, squirrels, and racoons, to name a few. These trees are highly adaptable to soil types and moisture conditions.

All of this said, we should not forget the importance of trees to our existence in general. They cleanse our atmosphere, cool our environment, beautify our surroundings, provide a habitat for animals, and so much more.

The District Grant awarded to **Roswell Rotary** and the **Rotary Club of Milton** funded a much-needed commercial oven for the Taste of Love kitchen. Taste of Love allows students to learn real-life kitchen and food skills. This year's curriculum centered around safety of food, knives, and appliances (stovetop and oven), using hand tools, reading recipes, identifying, and measuring ingredients and instructions on how to clean the kitchen. This is a great way to integrate other areas of focus into the school day, including peer interaction, reading and math goals and generalization of language skills.

A Roswell Rotarian made the Rotary International aprons. In December, the students baked cookies for both Roswell Rotary and the Rotary Club of Milton for their weekly lunch meetings as a gesture of thanks.

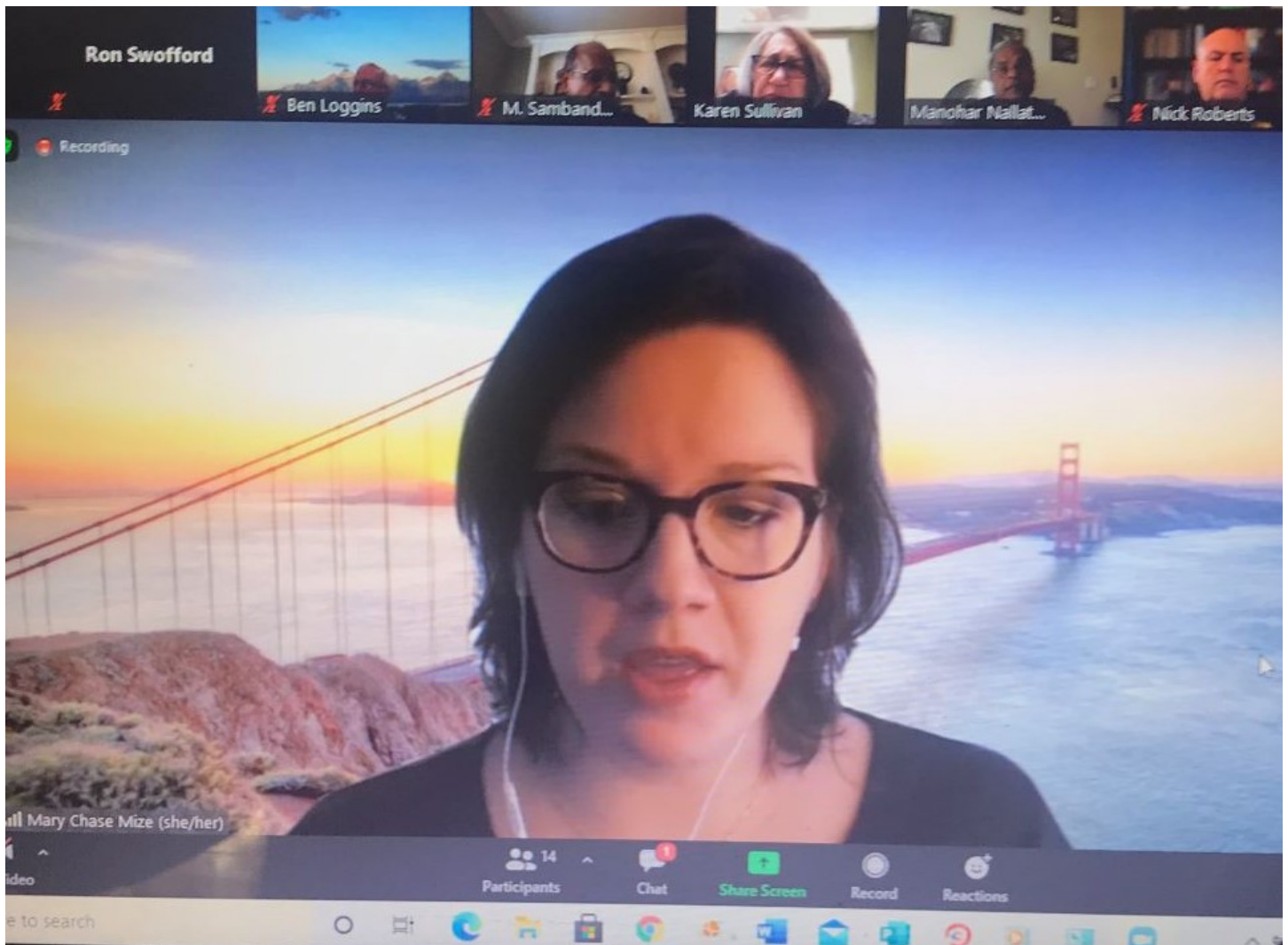

Graduate Student Focuses on Assisting Seniors; Preventing Suicides



In January, members of the **Rotary Club of Lake Spivey/Clayton County** were treated to a special Zoom presentation from Mary Chase Mize, a PhD candidate at Georgia State University (GSU). What made the program special? First, her description of a new way Rotarians can serve their communities. And second, her background - Ms. Mize received her undergraduate degree from Mississippi State University in 2013, with scholarship assistance provided by her hometown Rotary Club, the Rotary Club of Somerville Tennessee.

Since graduating from Mississippi State, she has earned a master's degree in clinical mental health counseling from GSU, and is working on both a PhD in Counselor Education and Practice and a Master of Arts degree in Gerontology - all at GSU.

Since 2018, Ms. Mize has been working with a research team that has partnered with the Administration for Community Living, which is a unit within the United States Department of Health and Human Services that was created to assist older adults and people of all ages with disabilities to live where they choose and with the ability to be active in their communities. A role of Ms. Mize's research team has been to initiate grant-funded research about how to equip home-delivered meal volunteers with skills to help older adults who might be experiencing mental health distress, especially those who may have thoughts of suicide. Suicide, Ms. Mize explained in her presentation, not only is a leading cause of death across the human lifespan but especially so for older adults. Older adults constitute 16% of the U. S. population but account for about 19% of all suicide deaths. Furthermore, researchers believe that suicide behaviors by older adults exceed the number of reported suicides by 40 to 100 times, which means, Ms. Mize says, that

although older adults already have one of the highest rates of suicide in the U. S., many more of their suicide deaths go unreported or unnoticed.

Precipitating factors are many. Older adults, for example, who complete suicide are more likely to be widow(er)s, to live alone, to perceive their health status as poor, to experience poor sleep, to experience loneliness, and to experience one or more stressful life events such as financial discord. Ms. Mize comments that many researchers agree that social isolation and loneliness play a key role in the high rate of suicide in later life.

The enhanced opportunity for service Ms. Mize presented to the club was an opportunity to participate in her research program and receive two days of Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST) free. The training is valued at \$500. This is a training model that is recognized by the Centers for Disease Control and is used in crisis centers across our country to equip volunteers like Rotarians with skills to help someone at a time when they are in their greatest need. Ms. Mize further explained that she was an ASIST Master-level trainer who during 2019 and 2020 had trained more than 150 metro Atlanta volunteers. As a result of that training, she said she has learned of 35 individuals who used the ASIST training to help older adults and other community members who were in distress and experiencing suicidal thoughts.

Training volunteers, Ms. Mize said, especially Rotarians, is meaningful because “by nature of simply who they are, are already well-positioned to support vulnerable individuals....” For additional information about suicide in the older adult population or the ASIST program, please contact Ms. Mary Chase Mize at email mmize1@student.gsu.edu.
