Thomasville Shows a Heart for Seniors



Editor's Note: One of the main reasons we donate to The Rotary Foundation is the good it allows us to do in the world. Here's a story that illustrates that. Take time to share your stories and think about what your contributions to the Foundation could do.

Thomasville Rotary used this year's District Grant to adopt local seniors. Club President Danny Braddy explained their new grant, saying every Rotary Club has access to an application provided by the Rotary Foundation. "Every club contributes to the Rotary Foundation and a lot of people leave their inheritance to the Rotary Foundation," Braddy said. Some of the money donated to The Rotary Foundation

comes back to the district for use in local projects. Our grant this year that was approved was for the seniors at Scott Senior Center,” Braddy shared. “When we were thinking about the grant, Rotarians in our club were the ones who got the Senior Center reopened and had a real passion for seniors.” The club made every senior a goody bag, complete with stationary, hygienic items and pre-stamped envelopes that allow the seniors to communicate with the Rotarians.

“There’s about 10 to 15 Rotarians who write the seniors and in the goody bags we provided a picture of the Rotarian who writes them, so they can see them,” Braddy said. “Then typically on Valentine’s Day, we have a cookout and grill hotdogs and hamburgers and that’s when they meet their pen pals.” In addition to the cookout, Rotary has also used the grant to sponsor a birthday luau.

Here We Grow Again!

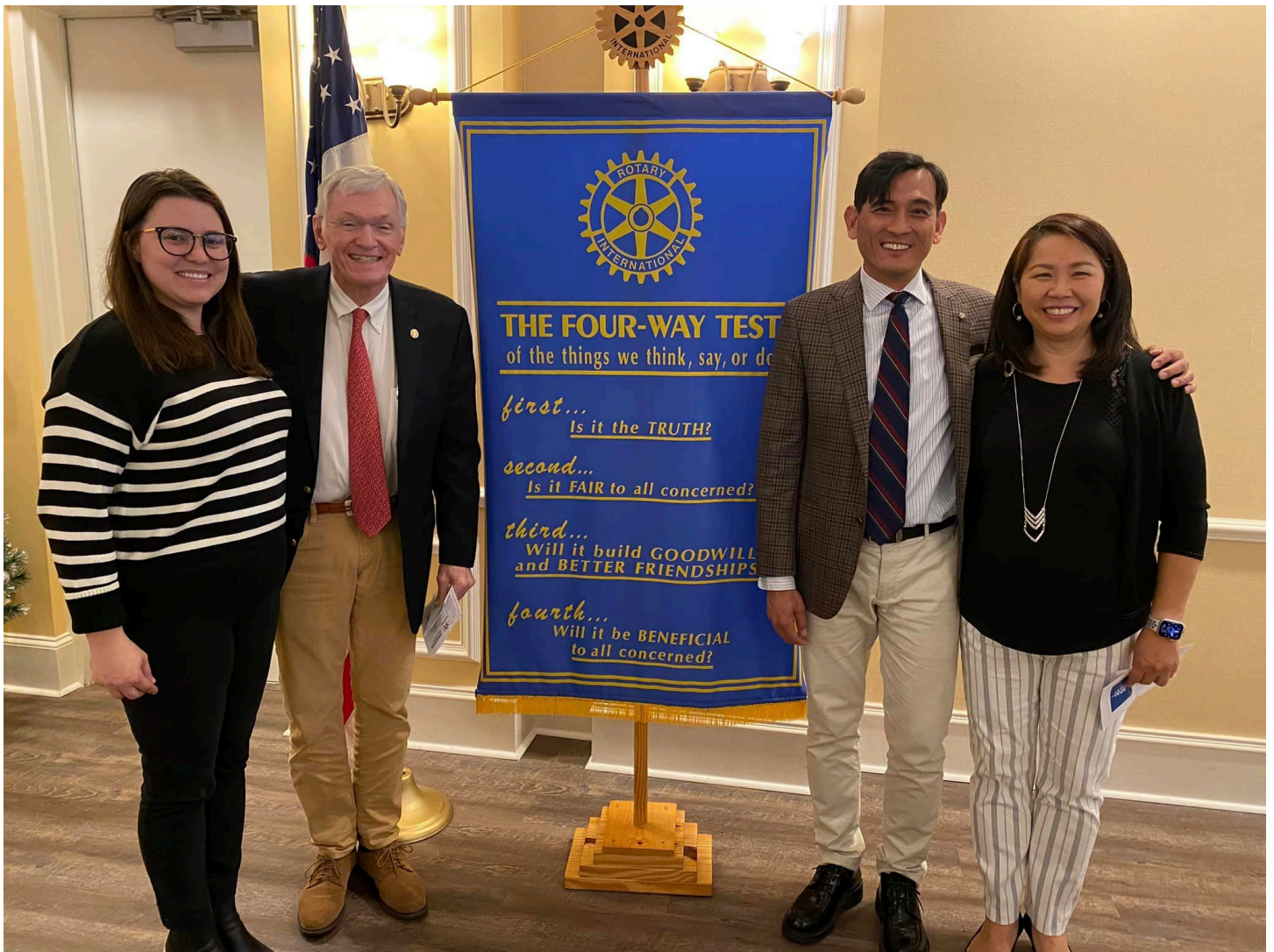

According to Shirley Anne Smith, she is—and forever will be—a Girl Scout.

"When I was in the second grade, I joined a Girl Scout troop in Puerto Rico," she says. "What always stuck with me was the Girl Scout mission, which is to use your resources wisely and make the world a better place. I would say that has driven everything in my professional life."

Smith has enjoyed a prolific career in the nonprofit sector, working in leadership roles for such organizations as the Girl Scouts of Greater Atlanta and LaAmistad, Inc., an organization that prepares Latino students and families for success through academic and life enrichment programs. In 2016, she became the founding executive director of the Atlanta Fire Rescue Foundation which brings together individuals, businesses and civic groups to assist Atlanta's firefighters.

"When I began at LaAmistad in Buckhead, we had several families who experienced an apartment fire. Located across the street from that complex, my job was right next to it. Seeing how those firefighters helped families, how quickly they responded, created this interest in figuring out how I could support firefighters," Smith says. "I was naturally compelled to give back. As firefighters from Buckhead, she began looking for ways to get involved. The Rotary Foundation: Giving and Major Donor Credit

Most of you probably know that anyone who gives at least \$10,000 to The Rotary Foundation is recognized as a Major Donor. There are different levels of Major Donor recognition based on a person's contributions.

I have had some questions about what donations count toward Major Donor status when you give money to The Rotary Foundation. Some people seem to think that only their donations to the Annual Fund count.

Here's some clarification: Any donation to The Rotary Foundation by a Rotarian or any other individual counts toward his/her individual giving record and will be credited toward Major Donor status. This includes donations to The Annual Fund, PolioPlus, Peace Programs, or a specified donation to one of the seven areas of focus.

It is also true that a new cash donation you make to recognize another person can make someone a Paul Harris Fellow counts toward your personal Foundation Account, but does not count to the recognized person's Foundation account. A person only receives credit toward Major Donor status for their own donation to their personal account.

Hopefully this helps you understand how donations are recorded in your Rotary Foundation account and count toward Major Donor status. You can ask your club Foundation chair to check your balance or sign into My Rotary at www.rotary.org to see where you stand and make additional contributions.

Sandy Springs Brings Vision to Local Schools



The **Rotary Club of Sandy Springs** recently partnered with a national organization called Vision to Learn to provide nearly 800 pairs of glasses for students in Fulton County Schools based in Sandy Springs. Most recently, the club provided over 240 students at Sandy Springs Middle School with either the first glasses they've ever received or the only ones they have had on their own.

During the two-day delivery process, we heard many good stories from students. One of them was very telling, however. The child put on his glasses for the first time and quietly said, "Wow- I can see!" It's something most of us take for granted, but for a student who had been struggling to see many things and read in class, that revelation was life-altering for him.

Vision to Learn was started in Northridge, California by Austin Beutner in 2012. Austin started the non-profit because he found out that so many children in Los Angeles-area schools were struggling in school, partly because they couldn't see the board or read clearly. The idea was to bring a vision clinic to the kids (or at Boys and Girls Clubs) access whether the children needed glasses and if so, to ultimately provide the kids with cost-free glasses for them to be able to see and do better in school and life.

As of 2022, Vision to Learn has visited 5000 schools and Boys and Girls Clubs around the United States - providing 350,000 children with glasses. They currently have 50 mobile clinics and over 200 employees working for them.

Our club visited the Sandy Springs Middle School on December 8, 2022, and I've included one picture of that visit/delivery as an attachment. (Note: the other picture is from October when we first presented the donation of \$10000 to purchase the glasses.) We have more glasses to deliver in 2023 and will be working on that with Fulton County School Leadership during Q1.

Roswell Helps Kids "Sing in the Rain"

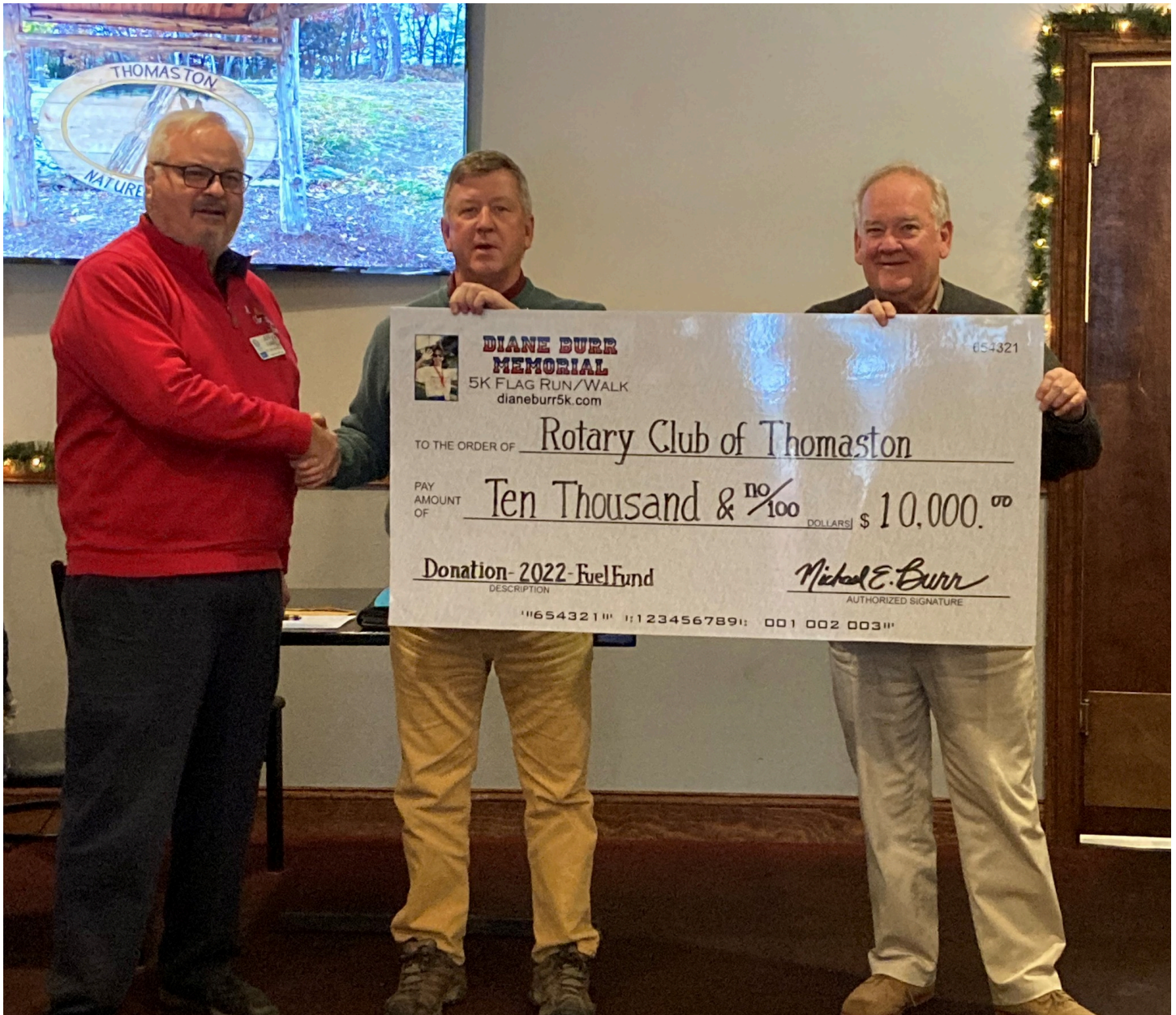
