We are three quarters through our Rotary year. Thank you for all you are doing for Rotary. Everywhere I go, I see the impact Rotary is having on all the communities in our District and many places around the world. I was particularly touched recently by the work of the Peachtree City Rotary Community Corps - as they fund and train service dogs for people who need them in the community - and was happy to be able to provide a district grant to help them expand their reach in this area. Still Time to Sign Up for Green Acres ... The Place to Be April 27-30

This month, we have a special opportunity to gather for fun, fellowship, a little bit of beach, a little bit of learning, at District Conference in SanDestin, Florida from April 27 to April 30. Our theme is Green Acres and in keeping with that theme:

Earlier on Friday, we will hold a Leadership luncheon for the presidents, assistant governors and district leadership. And Friday afternoon features a reception and buffet dinner in honor of the District 6900 Rotary clubs.

At Friday night's plenary session, we will hear from Ms. Whitney O'Connor, a licensed therapist, public speaker and cancer survivor with a mission to encourage people to celebrate themselves and their circumstances by sharing how she created her own silver linings. GRSP Update

Pelham hosts GRSP Students for 57th International Weekend



Taking time to slow the pace and learn to say pecan seemed to be the theme for Georgia Rotary Student Program scholars who spent four days learning about rural life in South Georgia during a student weekend at the end of March. The **Rotary Clubs of Pelham, Bainbridge, Camilla and Thomasville** hosted the 40 GRSP scholars as they stayed with area Rotarians for the Larry Frosteg Pelham International Weekend, which served as 57th annual International Weekend event.

Ana Perez of Colombia attends Georgia Gwinnett College and is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Sugarloaf. "It was interesting to be out of the city and experience a small town," Perez said.

Scholars toured Pelham High School and historic Thomasville for a visit to Pebble Hill Plantation, which features a stately home along with 3,000-acres including barns and a museum. Thomasville, the home of GRSP Founder William "Will" A. Watt, Sr., also featured a stop at the signature GRSP Peace Plaza and Will Watt Memorial Fountain at the Courtyard by Marriott Thomasville Downtown as Watt's grandson and namesake, Will Watt III shared history and stories about his family's legacy.

Celina Duong said she enjoyed visiting the local high school. Duong is from Vietnam, sponsored by the Rotary Club of East Cobb and attends Kennesaw State University. "I've never explored a high school in the United States," she said. "It was nice to meet the students, faculty and staff there and see the school."

While some tours included on previous years for the Pelham Weekend were not an option for this year's group, the students were able to view an expansive citrus farm.

Sarah Engonjo, who is from the Democratic Republic of Congo and is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Tifton, attends Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College. She said she enjoyed the quick visit to the citrus farm where they learned how the staff budded trees to yield the sweetest fruit and saw the difference in color between citrus trees grown from seeds.

The weekend ended with a banquet and student talent show, featuring a lot of karaoke and laughter. Camden County will host the final student weekend April 13-16 in coastal St. Mary's before the scholars attend their respective district conferences and conclude the year-long scholarship program in May.

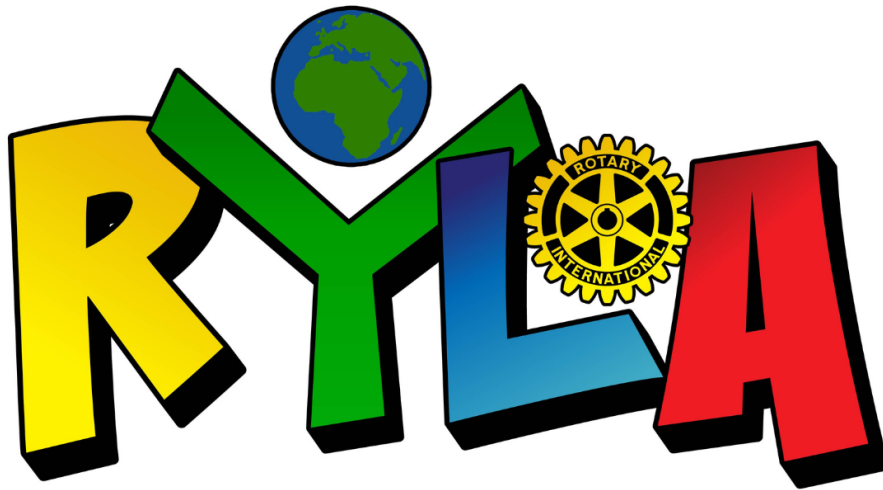

District Grants Are Now Community Grants

As you can see by the headline, the District Grants program is changing. We are now **COMMUNITY Grants**. This change is made to avoid ongoing confusion with the District Designated Funds (DDF) that are passed along to the District from The Rotary Foundation (TRF) as one block grant. This block grant is also a District Grant. Another reason for the change is to remind ourselves that 50% of our donations to TRF Annual Fund comes back to D6900 three years later for use in our communities. What a wonderful way to create hope right in our own back yard!

We also have other improvements coming to the grant program such as **Rotaract Clubs can now apply** for a Community Grant in conjunction with their sponsoring club. Funding is lower for a Rotaract Club for this first year as we need to test the program and make sure we don't run out of grant funding. Rotaract Club grant funding will be evaluated at the end of the 2024 Community Grant year (around April '24) and adjustments will be made based on the success of the program. **(In order to have Rotaract Clubs apply, be sure their information is updated on the District website at rotary6900.org.)**

We have added a **Collaborative grant category to join our Standard and Competitive grants**. This grant will allow three (or more) Rotary Clubs to apply for a Community Grant of up to \$30,000! One Collaborative grant will be selected for the upcoming year. The more clubs collaborating, the merrier!

So what does your club need to do to take advantage of the world of Community, Competitive and/or Collaborative Grants for the 2023/24 Rotary year?

- **Meet the March 31, 2023** deadline for submitting ALL your documentation for 2022-23 district grants spending to District 6900 via Rotary6900. All that paperwork must be fully accepted and the 2022-23 grant must be closed by **April 7, 2023**.
- **Get your project ideas ready now** - know what your community needs and how you can help so you're ready to complete the grant applications. And think about the clubs you might collaborate with on a larger community project.
- **Attend Training Session for Community Grants, Competitive Grants, and the exciting Collaborative Grant worth up to \$30,000** (remember at least three or more clubs planning and implementing one entire project together) - training dates will be announced soon.
- **Submit your grant applications to the District by May 15, 2023** - 2023-2024 Community, Competitive and Collaborative Grants received by the District. Start Planning now as no requests will be honored after this day.

On May 19, 2023, - 2023-2024 Competitive and Collaborative proposals will be reviewed and winners will be selected and notified.

We hope to make additional improvements to the Community Grant program and announce those changes soon. For now, check out the provisions for [grants for the 2023-2024 Rotary year](#) with regards to funding and deadlines. Let the planning begin!

Zoom discussion/training sessions for the 2023-2024 Grant year will be scheduled soon to be held after April 7, 2023, which is when the current grant season must be closed out.

Join Sandy Springs Pickleball Tournament

Tennis Center near the intersection of Roswell Road and Abernathy. A portion of the proceeds will go to one of our community partners, Vision To Learn. Vision To Learn is a not-for-profit organization that provides free eye exams and glasses to children in low-income communities across the United States. This year, the Rotary Club of Sandy Springs partnered with Vision to Learn, and our club donated more than 800 pair of eyeglasses to elementary and middle school students in Sandy Springs.

Our club is now registering players for the Pickleball Madness Tournament. All skill levels are accepted. If you've never played Pickleball before you can pick it up in mere minutes - I played just one time a few weeks ago for an hour and I'm ready to play! North Cobb Educates about Sex Trafficking Issues



Earlier this year, the **North Cobb Rotary** hosted “The Truth About Sex Trafficking” in partnership with Rescuing Hope (rescuinghope.com) and through grant funds from Rotarian Action Group Against Slavery that is a collaboration between **RC of Marietta, RC of Smyrna, RC of Alpharetta and RC of North Cobb.**

Rescuing Hope Founder Susan Norris moderated a panel of law enforcement and community experts in discussion of sex trafficking in our community and across our state. Panelists included Kaitlyn Salinas from the GA Attorney General Human Trafficking Division, Ana Murphy Supervisor of Cobb Schools Social Workers, Julie Bossie Director of ER Nursing Wellstar/Douglas Hospital, Acworth PD Chief and Rotarian Jesse Evans, Detective Daniel Wood of Kennesaw PD, Lieutenant David Collins of Marietta PD, FBI SA Josh Norris, and Roswell Rotarian and Co-Founder of RAGAS David McCleary.

The room of 150 or so attendees heard a frank description of internet grooming of young people, the signs of someone caught in trafficking, active trafficking cases in our community and the state as well as ways to join in awareness training for the community. Ample evidence was presented to indicate that trafficking of people, particularly young teens, is a threat throughout Georgia.

Rescuing Hope provides training for schools, EMS and first responders, Law Enforcement and other organizations that might be on the front line. Awareness programs are also available to churches, business associations and ROTARY CLUBS.

Rotarians Awarded National Presidential Volunteer Service Award



At the end of the **Rotary Club of Stone Mountain's** fundraising event, President Cesar announced that there were two other awards to present. These surprise awards were Presidential Volunteer Service Awards and were presented to Past Presidents Cynthia Dorsey Edwards (2013-2014 and 2020-2021) and Irvine Weekes (2021-2022). The President's Volunteer Service Award is a civil award bestowed by the President of the United States. Established by executive order by George W. Bush, the award was established to honor volunteers that give hundreds of hours per year helping others through the President's Council on Service and Civic Participation.

Through his personal efforts and with a commitment to secrecy from President David Cesar, Dr. Thomas L. Smith established the Rotary Club of Stone Mountain as an official certifying organization to award the Presidential Volunteer Service Award

(PVSA) to volunteers. Certifying Organizations verify and certify that a volunteer has met the requirements to receive a PVSA within a 12-month period specified by the Certifying Organization. To receive an award, a volunteer must complete eligible service within a 12-month period. Designated hours of service qualify volunteers for annual Bronze, Silver, and Gold Awards and, over a lifetime, for Lifetime Achievement Awards. Rotarians Edwards and Weekes were presented Gold Awards earned by volunteering more than 500 hours of unpaid acts of volunteer service benefitting others within a designated period of 12 months.
